we do have 72" diamond reflective tape on the back of our Buggy and use 2 lanterns as needed in the dark, which was approved April 1, 1966 by Warren C. Nelson Director of Highway Safety State of Ohio. we also added a 10"X12" white rectangle with reflective tape to take place of the SMV sign, and 2 white pipes on left rear wheel with reflective tape, which has a movement when driving on the road and is easily seen, instead of the flashing light which we had a church counsel not to have
